DIY PET FIRST AID KIT

Although you keep your pet safe, happy, and healthy, there are always accidents that we cannot prepare for. Here is something that you can do to help in the case of an emergency. By having a pet first aid kit ready to go, you could save your pet's life!

Pet First Aid Kit Checklist

<input type="checkbox"/>	The phone number, name and address of your vet
<input type="checkbox"/>	The phone number, name, and address of a local vet emergency clinic
<input type="checkbox"/>	The phone number of an Animal Poison Control Center
<input type="checkbox"/>	Your pet's medical record (<i>medications, vaccination history</i>)
<input type="checkbox"/>	Gauze (<i>for wrapping wounds</i>)
<input type="checkbox"/>	Adhesive tape (<i>to secure the gauze wrap or a bandage</i>)
<input type="checkbox"/>	Cotton balls or swabs
<input type="checkbox"/>	3% hydrogen peroxide (<i>to induce vomiting, must be fresh & check with your vet or animal poison control expert before giving this to your pet</i>)
<input type="checkbox"/>	Milk of magnesia or activated charcoal (<i>to absorb poison, check with your vet or animal poison control expert before giving to your pet</i>)
<input type="checkbox"/>	Digital thermometer (<i>need a fever thermometer that goes high enough for pets</i>)
<input type="checkbox"/>	Ice pack
<input type="checkbox"/>	Disposable gloves
<input type="checkbox"/>	Scissors with a blunt end
<input type="checkbox"/>	Tweezers
<input type="checkbox"/>	Antibiotic ointment
<input type="checkbox"/>	Liquid washing detergent (<i>for bathing</i>)
<input type="checkbox"/>	Towels
<input type="checkbox"/>	Small flashlight
<input type="checkbox"/>	Oral syringe or kitchen baster
<input type="checkbox"/>	Alcohol wipes
<input type="checkbox"/>	Styptic powder (<i>to stop bleeding from cutting nail quicks</i>)
<input type="checkbox"/>	Saline eye solution
<input type="checkbox"/>	Artificial tear gel
